### **District Officer's Memo**

### Important dates for prospective retirees:

This a reminder of some key dates\* for prospective retirees. \*Updated timelines for 2019-20 have been posted in First Class. Prospective **June 2020** *teacher* retirees must provide notice of their intent to retire by **Monday, March 30, 2020**. Those intending to retire at the end of this school year may be interested in terminating their LTD premiums for the balance of the school year. Contact the District 3 office for information on **how to apply for LTD premium termination**.

**Non-teaching** members intent on retiring this year should consider providing more than the minimum two weeks' notice required to ensure that the OMERS pension plan has adequate time to ensure pension payments start on time. The RDSB confirms that although they only require two weeks' notice of intent to retire, it is in members' best interests to provide more than two weeks' notice.

OSSTF recommends that anyone planning to retire does so on the last day of the month. Both pension plans (OMERS and OTPP) begin pension payments only in the month following retirement.

#### Post-retirement benefits:

Members of the OSSTF Benefits Plan who are planning to retire should be aware that their extended healthcare benefits cease upon retirement. There are several providers of health and dental benefits for retirees.

### Walk into Retirement with a Plan (OTIP): Thursday, April 30, 2020 at 5pm at the Caruso Club.

Registration is now open at www.otip.com/For-Retirees. Click on the button "Free Retirement Workshop." Workshops are listed by date. You must register online to attend this workshop. Even if you are still a few years away from retirement, it is worthwhile attending to start planning for your post-retirement health & dental benefits. This workshop is open to all members of all bargaining units. Spots fill up quickly, as this workshop is also open to AEFO, CUPE, ETFO, and OECTA members.

Sometimes it may take years to figure out how you can help make a difference in this world. I mean, really... how can one person contribute anything substantial? It was a quote by Margaret Mead that stirred me to action...

Late fall I applied for the **OSSTF International Assistance Grant Program** and received \$3,000! My mission team out of Trinity United Church in Lively will be offering a sewing workshop at the vocational school in the Dominican Republic when we go on the March Break. The grant is to be used for educational purposes and our team is working on a housing project. So I coordinated how OSSTF with the Director of the *Instituto Tecnico Educativo V.P.* and we created a workshop that will support students and the school. We are very excited to receive this grant for the second time (first in 2011 for a classroom/library in Nicaragua). Education creates opportunities that can help lift people out of poverty.



The vocational school was established to help the under-educated, poor people of the North Coast learn skills that would lead to viable employment, allowing them to provide for their families and avoiding an otherwise inevitable life spent in compromising situations.

We are very grateful for this support from our Union. Please don't forget about the grant program if you are considering or planning any social justice work around the world. Here is the website to apply.

Carson, a coach and advisor to CEOs and entrepreneurial managers around the world, who focuses on helping older women in particular, thought that the words spunky, old, and broad all had negative connotations, and decided to put them together to create something positive, coming up with Spunky Old Broads (SOBs). The day and month celebrate women 50 and older who don't want to get old quietly, and "who are interested in living a regret-free life."

The month of February was chosen as it is Dr. Carson's birth month.

### In my endless quest for more useless information to share in the LINK, I discovered that:

### February 5 is officially "World Nutella Day"!!

- When chocolate became a scarce, pricey, and rationed commodity during WW2, Italian pastry maker Pietro Ferrero added hazelnuts to extend the cocoa supply. And so, in 1946, Pasta Gianduja was born!
- WTF is Pasta Gianduja? Before adopting the name Nutella, the chocolaty spread was actually a sliceable loaf named after a creepy traditional Piedmontese carnival character and marionette named Gianduja.
- For years, Pasta Gianduja (now called Supercrema) was free for Italian children - shops all over Italy honored a BYOB (bring your own bread) policy where kids could bring in their own slice of bread and get the complimentary spread.
- In 1963, Ferrero's son Michele Ferrero revamped Supercrema with the intention of marketing it throughout Europe. Its composition was modified, and it was renamed "Nutella". The first jar of Nutella left the factory in Alba on April 20, 1964 and was finally made available in Canada in 1974.
- A jar of Nutella is sold every 2.5 seconds
- Approximately 1.35 million pounds of Nutella are produced every day
- The definitively correct pronunciation is "new tell-uh" not "nuh-tell-uh."
- In 2014, a French couple named their baby Nutella. The government deemed this an unacceptable name and legally renamed the child "Ella" when the family failed to show up to court.
